Sunday 4th January EPIPHANY

10.0 a.m. Parish Communion

Isaiah 60.1-6 *Arise, shine, for your light has come – the glory of The Lord. You shall see and be radiant – your heart shall rejoice.*
Ephesians 3.1-12 *Paul's call to include non-Jews into God's people Israel. This is the new thing in Christianity – that the Messiah is for all – the Saviour of the world. God's promise is for all who trust in Him.*

Matthew 2.1-12 *The Gentile Magi, astronomers from Persia/Iran come to worship Jesus, bearing gifts. The evil ruler in Jerusalem fails to kill Jesus, but kills lots of other babies, leaving Mary weeping.*

Sunday 11th January Epiphany 1 – the Baptism of Christ

10.0 a.m. Parish Communion.

Acts 10.34-43 *Peter's sermon to the first Gentile converts, the Roman soldier Cornelius and co. The Spirit coming upon them is now called the Gentile Pentecost. Peter's message: Jesus empowered by the Spirit went around doing good, healing the oppressed, vindicated by God.*

Matthew 3.13-17 *John the Baptist is embarrassed about baptising a man with nothing to repent of. A voice from heaven says who Jesus is – God's beloved Son.*

6.30 p.m. Evening prayer

Sunday 18th January Epiphany 2

10.0 a.m. Parish Communion

Isaiah 49.1-7 *The second 'Servant Song' of Deutero-Isaiah, writing from exile in Babylon. God called him in the womb. It was a struggle – people would not listen to his good news from God. But the message was spread to Gentiles, so God's salvation would extend to the end of the earth and the Holy One of Israel would raise him up.*

1 Corinthians 1.1-9 *Paul addresses a congregation he established in Greece which has big problems – but first he reminds them of the positives – God called them and is reliable.*

John 1.29-42 *John the Baptist identifies Jesus as God's lamb who will deal with the world's sin. He recalls the Spirit coming down on Jesus and remaining on him. Two of John's disciples move on to meet and follow Jesus. One was St Andrew – the first to realize that Jesus was the Messiah here (contrast Mark 8.27-30).*

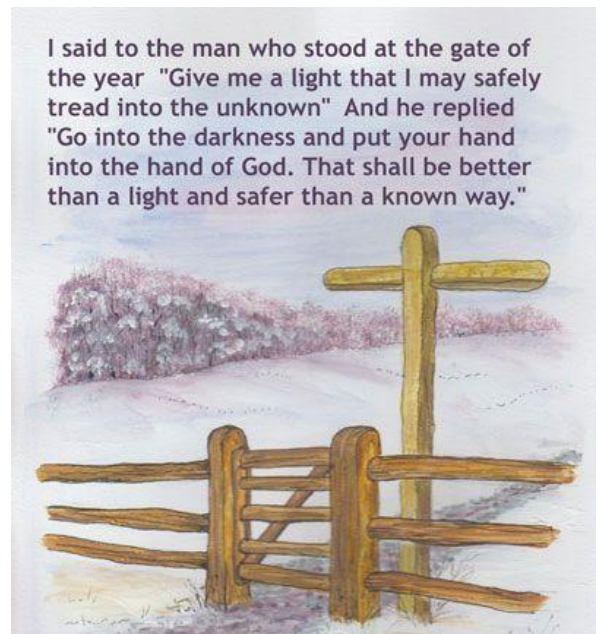
6.30 p.m. Evening prayer

Sunday 25th January Epiphany 3 Conversion of St Paul

Acts 9.1-22 *On the road to Damascus the Pharisee Saul has a vision of the risen Jesus Messiah and goes to Ananias to be baptized. God has chosen this fanatic to bring the gospel to non-Jews as well. He will suffer (martyrdom in Rome). Compare Acts 22 and 26.12.*

Matthew 19.27-30 *The cost of discipleship and its rewards. Giving up family and possessions for Jesus' sake will bring miracles, and fullness of life.*
