



- e. AH has asked Kompan and Playsource to quote to replace the Janaway surface with Tiger Mulch
- f. **Bus shelter by village hall** (PA): This has been repaired & improved by asylum seekers, who have done an excellent job.
- g. Reports to FixMyStreet (PA/AH)

i. hedges in Henley Road (ref. 4506255) (outstanding) and Pheasant Walk (4547621) (done)

ii. pavement on Church Road between the Old School House and the bend (4901310) (outstanding)

iii. footpath from Heyford Hill Lane to A4074 (4901339) (being done) iv. trees near the Heyford Hill Lane bus shelter that obscure sight of the bus (4901261); (done).

- h. *Trees/branches overhanging VH cycle racks* (PA/MW): awaiting quote from Charlie Draper. The tree has now fallen down.
- i. **Tree preservation orders** (PA): The Kings Arms have cut down the hedge between the garden & the car park, apparently to deter drug-taking. This raises concerns about the horse chestnut and other trees in the pub grounds. ACTION: PA & Liz Shatford to liaise with Peter Emery to discuss applying for Tree Protection Orders for trees in the vicinity.
- j. **Salt:** OCC are offering a salt bag delivery and salt bin top-up at the end of October.

4. Oxfordshire Countrywide 20 Mph Speed Limit Project: AGREED by majority vote not to proceed

- **1. Reports from District and County Councillors**: OCC report available on the website, SODC report will be available in due course.
- 2. Village maintenance
- a. **Deep cleansing**/gutter cleaning (AH): SCR has identified the SODC office dealing with this and will inspect the schedule.
- b. Grass cutting & maintenance schedule (PA/AH)

A resident of Heyford Hill Lane has complained that the unmown portions of the verges in HHL are unsightly and asked why they have not been mown in the same way as the grass at The Wharf.

ACTION: A letter will be sent to explain the mowing at the Wharf was an error by the contractors and the current policy remains unchanged. The treeline between OPT & PC land at the end of Broadhurst Gardens needs attention, for example to pollard willow trees in danger of collapse. ACTION: DT & PA to meet OPT (Hannah Brockwell) & a tree surgeon *in situ* to discuss the work required and apportioning costs.

More work is required on brambles & nettles at Broadhurst Gardens. There will be an on-site meeting with TLGO to discuss requirements, and a meeting also to discuss (i) encroachment of brambles by the Fox Furlong goalposts (ii) overhanging trees in Church Road.

c. Large rubbish bins (PA)

SODC policy is to reduce the number of bins and encourage people to take rubbish home. The particular pressure on rubbish disposal at Sandford Lock will be explained to them. If necessary, the bin at the corner of the Rec on Church Road could be removed to decrease the number of bins. PC will ask Environment Agency to install bins in the car park at Sandford Lane.

d. Maintenance of play areas

including Church Road kissing gate & Janaway play area (PA/AH): A member of the public was concerned that the price of a concrete base on the Church Road kissing gate (£800 + VAT) was high.

The PC acknowledged this and will get alternative quotes for the Henley Road kissing gate. So far, one quote of £720 (with no VAT payable) has been received and another is expected.

i. nettles & brambles at the end of Broadhurst Gardens/Yeftly Drive, especially brambles that are beginning to encroach on residents' gardens.

ii. willow trees between Broadhurst Gardens & Heyford Meadow that need to be pollarded. Some of these are probably on OPT and/or Thames Water land.iii. maintaining the raised sitting area at the end of the village hall.

iv. mowing a 2 m strip around the perimeter of the village hall car park v. aerate & seed grass in the Church Road rec., by the double gates

c. Large rubbish bins: PA to ask if PC can pay Biffa directly to empty them.

d. **Maintenance of wooden equipment in recreation ground:** the asylum seekers have started work on playground equipment. AH has written risk assessment for this work and will monitor the work & buy supplies of stain etc. as required.

e. **Maintenance of play areas** (AH) Kompan have repaired the edges of the Fox Furlong playground. The latest inspection reported the level of bark in Janaway playground is too low, exposing membrane and foundations. Kompan to quote for replace bark with Tiger Mulch and bag up the old bark for reuse on paths by the Broadhurst Gardens play area.

f. **Overhanging hedges** (PA/AH): waiting for action from OCC on Henley Road & Pheasant Walk hedges. The hedge at the bottom of Heyford Hill Lane overhangs the path a little but is not considered to be of immediate concern. AH to monitor & chase OCC as necessary. The pavement on Church Road between the Old School House and the bend is badly overgrown. AH to report on FixMyStreet.

g. Footpath from Heyford Hill Lane to A4074 is overgrown with brambles from both sides, and there are trees near the bus shelter that obscure sight of the bus. ACTION: AH to report on FixMyStreet & monitor OCC's response.

h. **Progress report on orchard**: Voco will cut the hedges in Church Road now and once a year. If insufficient, the PC will ask TLGO to do supplementary cuts.

i. VH garden: TLGO will be asked to maintain the area.

j. **Bus shelter by village hall**: PC to pay for materials (£250) for Iranian cabinet maker to repair and improve the bus shelter.

k. Manhole cover in Broadhurst Gardens: repaired by an unknown person.

- I. Benches in Broadhurst Gardens: Dick Rudman has treated these.
- m. TS Gardening club: AGREED: to give club an extra £20 per month if needed.

i. Henley Road: OCC have written to the homeowner again and will cut hedge back if no response.

ii. Pheasant Walk: Actioned to be fixed

g. **Progress report on orchard** (PA): quote received from The Heritage Fruit Tree Company (Andy Howard) covering (1) initial consultation, (2) design & plan, (3) full planting service or (4) initial day's supervision of volunteer planters. There is £7,500 budget left, to be used by 2025. There would probably be 30-40 trees, depending on how big they are planned to grow. As the initial work has already been done only (2) & (4) are necessary. PA to contact Andy Howard.

h. **Volunteers to maintain VH garden**: PC may be able to give money to TS gardening club to maintain the VH end of the garden.

i. **Purchase of sander**: for maintenance of wooden benches & playground equipment AGREED: to go on borrowing Malcolm's sander, replacing components as needed. Buying sander is expensive and risks being stolen.

j. **Bus shelter by village hall**: a side panel has been vandalised and the shelter in general looks shabby. Perhaps asylum seekers could be asked to repair this.

k. **Manhole cover in Broadhurst Gardens**. Someone has removed soil from this, leaving concrete exposed. ACTION: AH to ask Dick Rudman to repair this and to varnish the old (garden-type) bench in Broadhurst Gardens play area. I. **Steps/ramp to recreation ground**. MB to make a preliminary plan for this.

Notes on the minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on **Monday 7 August 2023** at 6.30 pm in the Village Hall

Clerk's report: Nathan Evans of National Grid has contacted the clerk to ask about cutting back trees at the Sandford Brake substation. PC has no objections, but he should consult Butterfly Conservation who have a 10-year agreement to look after the Brake, and he should avoid the nesting season.
 Councillor co-option: Lewis Barrett's application for co-option accepted

unanimously.

3. Village maintenance

Notes on the minutes of the PCC held on Monday 3 July 2023.

1. Clerk's report

Proposed new constituencies can be seen on www.bcereviews.org.uk/. If the proposal is accepted, Sandford will be in the Didcot & Wantage constituency. **2. Village maintenance**

a. Deep cleansing/gutter cleaning (AH): no news yet: SCR will chase SODC.

b. **Grass cutting & maintenance schedule** (PA): The Landscape Group (TLGO) are coming randomly and not following the agreed schedule. In addition, the area behind Broadhurst Gardens & Yeftly Drive is congested with nettles and brambles and needs to be cut more often. ACTION: AH to contact TLGO with priorities: - Church Road Recreation Ground to be cut before the fete - Broadhurst Gardens/Yeftly Drive area to be cut with a brush cutter. ACTION: PA to ask Voco Hotel to cut the hedges in Church Road more often

c. Large rubbish bins (PA): The large bins would be difficult to remove, as they are fixed to the base with resin bolts. PA to suggest other solutions such as (i) asking Radley PC to put a bin in the car park on the other side of the lock and/or (ii) seeing if it is possible to fit standard 80 litre buckets into the new bins or (iii) contracting ODS to empty the new bins.

d. **Maintenance of wooden equipment in recreation ground** (AH): a group of asylum seekers have been repairing & treating this equipment. OALC have recommended doing a risk analysis for the job and asking the insurers whether the arrangement is acceptable. ACTION: AH to (i) adapt the orchard risk analysis to cover this work; (ii) contact the insurers.

ACTION: all to consider cost-effective ways to provide the asylum seekers with useful equipment such as haversacks/day packs as thanks for their help e.g. car boot sales, unused bags at home.

e. **Matting in play areas** (AH): Awaiting a quote from Kompan for this. The surface in Fox Furlong has risen further, creating a trip hazard. ACTION: AH to ask Kompan to add Fox Furlong to the quote.

And because they affect many in Sandford:

What are traffic filters?

The Council say: Traffic filters are separate from Low Traffic Neighbourhoods – they will involve closing off road (e.g. Hollow Way) at certain times to private cars, which will be prohibited from driving through the traffic filters without a permit while the filters are in operation. All other vehicles including taxis, buses, coaches, all vans, mopeds, motorbikes and HGVs can still pass through these traffic filters at all times. The filters are not physical barriers, automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) cameras will monitor and enforce the restrictions – it will be physically possible to drive through the filters during restricted times without a permit, but you will receive a penalty charge notice (PCN) if you do so. The traffic filters cover very short lengths of road (just a few metres) and any vehicle can use the road outside the filter at any time without a permit.

To test the traffic filters and allow people to comment on their impacts before making them permanent, they will be introduced on a trial basis initially. The trial phase will run for at least six months, allowing data and feedback from the public and stakeholders to be collected. It's possible to make some changes to the filters in response to monitoring and feedback during the trial. The traffic filters trial is not expected to start until the works to improve Oxford station are completed, which is expected to be in 2024.

And Low Traffic neighbourhoods?

Low traffic neighbourhoods are in action in Cowley and in East Oxford. The Cowley ones (e.g. Littlemore towards Cowley) seem to be here to stay – the East Oxford ones (e.g. Divinity Road) went through an additional short consultation period in June/July, which is now closed. As a result some modifications were suggested (e.g. number plate recognition instead of (vandalised) bollards in e.g. Divinity Road).

The County Council is now reviewing the survey responses and a second independent report will be produced. A decision on whether to continue the scheme will be made by the Council in October.

Nuneham Courtenay Parish Council news: Housing Infrastructure Fund 1 Road

The County Council's Planning and Regulation Committee voted 7-2 in July to reject the County Council's own planning application for the proposed road proposed for the' Didcot Garden Town' development.

But Secretary of State Michael Gove 'called in' the planning application seven days later and will appoint a Planning Inspector to hold an inquiry. This leaves the County Council in the uneasy position of having two conflicting roles at the inquiry: the organisation that submitted the planning application and the organisation that refused it.

The cynics among you may say politicians don't seem to find it difficult to face two ways at once, but it's only once in a blue moon that a panel of county councillors turn down a planning application from their own officers, so this is uncharted territory.

Nuneham parish council continues to work with other parish councils to challenge the shaky arguments for these separate scraps of new road, which look very like sections of the southern route originally proposed for the supposedly abandoned Oxford to Cambridge Expressway, that would have connected the A34 at Milton the M40 at Wheatley.

If the plan is implemented it will undoubtedly have a big impact on Sandford through a heavy increase of traffic on the A4074 and the possibility of shortcuts down Henley Road.

Progress on the two City developments near us:

The 'South Oxford Science Village' which extends the Science Park and includes 3000 new houses around Grenoble Road has been approved in principle but awaits a full planning application, expected by the end of 2023.

The re-opening of the Cowley Branch Line to passengers, which will involve two new stations – the first next to the Science Park and Littlemore (to be called Oxford South) and the second by Blackbird Leys (Oxford East). Oxford City Council has approved a £4.56 million package of funding and the next stage of work is to produce a full Business Case, setting out where the rest of the funding might come from. It does look as if it's likely to go ahead, and may by in use by the end of 2026.

Liz Shatford writes:

We are getting used to being surprised every now and again by an outbreak of colour and decoration around the village, notably for the Coronation this year and the celebrations for our late Queen's Platinum Jubilee. This we owe to the skill and craftsmanship of our very own Sandford on Thames WI.

The present/third Institute of Sandford-on-Thames WI made its first public appearance at the summer fete in 2016 with a stall demonstrating the cake baking prowess of members, with other items for sale to raise funds for the newly formed Institute. Jill Love announced the birth in the summer edition of The Link in these words

"... Some years ago Sandford-on-Thames did have a WI, and we are delighted to have this opportunity to re-start with new enthusiasm and energy. Our first meeting was really well attended, with lots of ideas and suggestions. We do not intend to follow the quote in the Daily Telegraph recently, "Boy Scouts for oldies". Rather, for our WI, once we have dealt with the official side, it can be what we, the members, want it to be.'

Since then the modern Institute has grown in strength with a strong and loyal membership forging friendships through various activities, learning new skills and enjoying trips out. The membership covers a t0 year age span and they all mix really well, learning so much from each other.

It must have been something similar around 100 years ago when the first Sandford WI was started in the dark days of WW1 by Mrs Marion Challenor. She and her sister-in-law had both lost their husbands in that war and were bringing up their children together in 'Bassimer' which occupied a large site to the south side of 'Tin Shed bridleway', the track off Church Road opposite the field entrance to the hotel which leads to the Baldons via Lower Farm. In those days Mrs Challoner and Mrs Woodford were central in organising many village activities, notably drama performances involving the village children and so it must have been natural for them to join in the rapidly growing National Federation of Women's Institutes in Great Britain.

And so 'Jerusalem' has been sung in Sandford for nearly 100 years now. The song was adopted because of its links to the women's suffrage movement, apart from its stirring words and music. The present Institute sings Jerusalem on special occasions when there is proper musical accompaniment available.

Music Therapy at Vale House

Vale House is unique amongst Residential Nursing Homes in Oxfordshire in employing two music therapists – Will Draper and Sharon Warnes – who



between them provide five days of music therapy every week. They run individual and group sessions, ensuring that every resident receives one session a week, with many residents accessing multiple sessions. The value of music therapy for people living with dementia has long been recognized, not least because "the response to music is preserved, even when dementia is very advanced" (Oliver Sacks, "Musicolphilia", p.336, 2007).

Four "open" group sessions take place most weeks, meaning ambulant residents can come and go as they please. Residents play hand-held percussion instruments if they choose; singing, moving and dancing are encouraged! The music therapists take their cue from residents, with a mixture of well-known and improvised songs.



The aims of group sessions include providing opportunities for selfexpression, communication, reminiscence and meaningful occupation through live, communal music-making, helping to reduce feelings of isolation, loneliness or depression, through the multiple social interactions that occur in each session. Relatives and visitors are encouraged to attend group sessions – they can offer valuable insights into the residents' musical preferences. In summer, group sessions may be held outside in the shaded courtyard garden. Residents unable to access group sessions receive individual sessions in their rooms; tailored to meet their needs and reduce their social isolation.

Residents also benefit from performances by visiting musicians, including: Matthew Arnold school choir, Sandford Church choir, Radley School choir, Thames Consort and professional entertainers specializing in putting on shows for Care Home residents. On 5th October there will be a concert featuring music from the 1940's and 50's, and December will feature Christmas Carol concerts, both 'in house' and with visiting Choirs – dates to be confirmed! *Sharon Warnes, Music Therapist*

Rest in peace

Bruce Richard Armour born 15th May 1940, died 9th July 2023, aged 83

Bruce, with his wife Susan who died in 2019, moved to Yeftley Drive in 1989, and they were both muchloved neighbours and part of the congregation at St Andrew's. Both were profoundly deaf, but Bruce turned this into a positive by becoming a Lay Preacher and for 48 years a very active Secretary for the Oxford Diocese Deaf Church, being awarded an 'LLM Emeritus' certificate for his long and faithful service.



Bruce was born on a sheep farm in New South Wales, and when he was 7 he went to the School for the Deaf in Sydney. In 1965 he began his travels, intending to stay away for two years but finding life good in England, with many more Deaf activities. He started at the Cowley works and became a skilled panel beater, trusted with all the most expensive cars. He loved travelling, as did Susan, and they spent many happy weekends away in this country and abroad – often through the Deaf Club, including many conferences and church related activities.

Bruce's funeral was in St Andrew's church on 27th July. He is much missed in the village, and our condolences to his son Mark, daughter Georgina and sister Bonita, and to his five grandchildren.

We also said farewell in July to **Jean Andrews**, aged 90, the mother of Linda Hackett with whom she was buried in St Andrew's Church graveyard after a service in church. She was an avid supporter of Oxford United and we offer condolences to her grandson Christopher Hackett of this parish and FC who visited her regularly and often at Marston Court, where she was cared for wonderfully by Sharon Fenn and her team. So thanks to you all from the rest of us who enjoyed Jean's friendship and still miss Linda. They will both be remembered at the memorial evensong at St Andrew's at 6.30 p.m. on Sunday 29th October (details p.2).
