



John Findon writes:

Some of you will know Ursula Fanthorpe's Christmas poem 'BC : AD' which ends beautifully with this thought about the birth in Bethlehem, the shepherds and the three kings:

This was the moment
When a few farm workers
And three members of an obscure Persian sect
Walked haphazard by starlight,
Straight into the kingdom of heaven.

It makes the point that our experience of human beings is capable of having a significance that is ultimate – 'the kingdom of heaven' in her words. One of Tolstoy's characters says at a time of great stress in 'War and Peace' that 'nothing is certain except the unimportance of everything within my comprehension and the grandeur of something incomprehensible but all-important'. The sense of something 'incomprehensible but all-important' has been part of my own experience for as long as I can remember, and I guess may be familiar to many of you.

Christmas says to us that such significance is to be found in human beings. Its effect on us should therefore be disturbing. For, if this birth, then every birth may speak of the kingdom of heaven. 'Have yourself a merry little Christmas' would be so cosy as to be nauseous: this festival above all should shake us out of complacency and point us to the ultimate importance of every human child. That was what Ebenezer Scrooge learnt from his three ghosts. Most of us are lucky enough to have people who belong to us; if we are very lucky, they are people whom we find it easy to love. But that could only be the beginning: Christmas tells us that our life's work will be to widen and deepen that love in response to the love of God for us all.

THE CRIB AND CHRISTINGLE SERVICE will begin on Christmas Eve at 4.30pm. We shall set up the Crib and light the Christmas candle. There will be a collection for the Children's Society and christingles will be distributed for you to take home and light again at Christmas lunch. Children (and any courageous others) are welcome to come dressed as Nativity characters. It will be dark when we come out of Church, and of course by Jewish reckoning the new day begins at night-fall.

THE CHRISTMAS SERVICE OF LESSONS AND CAROLS will take place on **Sunday 14th December** at 6.30 pm. We look forward to welcoming everyone for an hour of joyful singing.

The Science Park.

You may have seen media articles about the Ellison institute's expansion plans over the next decade involving an increase to 7,000 employees. In the plan, the Sandford side of the Science Park will be utilised with some or all the existing buildings except the 3 new buildings under construction being demolished to make way for a Norman Foster designed unified "Campus". The 7,000 employees will replace those already working there and not be in addition however it's not known if there will be an overall increase or decrease. The investment is apparently £10 billion over at least 10 years and the current pause in the construction of the three separate new buildings is related to their redesign which in the architect's model, shows them connected and part of a much larger complex of buildings.

Whether this near total redevelopment plan will survive as currently proposed is anybody's guess but a £10 billion investment by the world's second richest man and designed by Norman Foster, is unlikely to face serious opposition. The recently confirmed Cowley train service stations etc will also be designed by Foster and partners.

The Parish council is having meetings with the contactor, Laing O'Rourke, to discuss problems related to the construction in Littlemore and also separately with EIT and the Science park management to discuss possible benefits to and cooperative projects with Sandford. His ashes will be placed in the Garden of Remembrance here after a short service on 18th December.

His move to Sandford was into familiar territory; he had been a willing errand-boy for his grandparents at the Isis Farmhouse Hotel during his school holidays. After National Service he spent 38 years working at the Morris factory, and moved with Lil to Main Avenue in 1997. You never saw him without a smile, and he learned to be a very competent and willing head cook as Lil became less able to stand for long in the kitchen. During his last months she cared for him as his health failed, and has since moved to a nursing home in Didcot. Neighbours will miss their kindness and cheerful sociability. May he rest in peace.

Talking Shop Apple pressing day 2025.

Arguably the best apple pressing day to date!! This year was a "Mast" year because the collective term for a bumper crop of tree and shrub fruits, nuts, and seeds is "mast", an old English word. These events occur periodically and provide a significant food source for wildlife, which is why the phenomenon is important for ecosystems.

We had so many apples we ran out of time even with two presses on the go. Our new apple "Scratter" did the job, efficiently pulping apples (and some pears) before going into the presses and then onto the bottlers who had trouble keeping up. In a few more years, the community orchard should provide enough to keep us going for days!

All this produced about £250 for TS and having our own equipment saved a further £40 in hire fees so a great community effort with a very useful contribution to TS funds.

Hope to see you in 2026. (A Mast year is often followed by a low crop year so we may need everybody to step up their fruit donations in 2026).

The Power of Poetry

At Vale House, we have discovered that reading poetry to residents who are no longer mobile and cannot speak allows for special communication between us as they listen to the old, familiar words.



"Poetry is like music without the instruments", someone said to me once. The music is in the words and how they come together, with the rhythms and, sometimes, but not always, the rhymes. The "instrument" is the human voice. Poems tell stories, share emotions and feelings, express thoughts. At Vale House, there is a battered, old copy of "I wandered lonely as a cloud and other poems you half remember from school" edited by Ana Sampson.

Perhaps that is where the power of the poetry lies. So many of the poems are half remembered. "Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness" by Keats, "This is the night train crossing the border" by Auden, Masfield's "Sea Fever", Shakespeare's sonnet "Shall I compare thee to a summer's day" and dozens of others . . . the residents listen quietly.

Nothing compares, however, with the effect of lyrical Chinese poetry from the 8th to the 12th centuries - poets such as Tu Fu, Lu Yu, Chu Hai, Hau Chao, Su Tung and the woman poets Li Ch'ing Chau and Chu Shu Shen. Here we enter a world of wild swans, chrysanthemums and plum blossom, of the East and West winds, of loneliness, of drunkenness (a lot of wine is drunk in these poems), of long journeys, of quiet times, of retirement, of waiting for a lover to return, of greying hair, of sadness and loss.

Some of the poems are as short as four lines or a couple of four-line verses. Others are much longer. Often each line is a sentence with no direct connection to the next line. The last line may be a question, or half question: "Misty, indistinct, the shadow of a lone wild goose?" (Su Tung). In translation there are usually no rhymes. The apparent simplicity hides complex thoughts about the human condition. I can read twenty Chinese poems one after the other, and the residents will still want more.

Sometimes they open their eyes and nod their heads. And when I ask if they would like me to visit them again, most of them indicate that they would.

Indices of deprivation

The English Indices of Deprivation 2025, updated every 3-5 years, has been published, and shows that while 21 of Oxford's 83 neighbourhoods are in the 10% *least* deprived areas in England, of our near neighbours two areas in Northfield Brook are in the top 10% *most* deprived areas in England, and four (2 in Blackbird Leys, 1 in Littlemore, and 1 in Rose Hill) are in the top 20%.

Oxfordshire's councils are voting through rival plans for local government reorganisation.

The county's existing councils have not been able to agree on a way forward - meaning three different proposals will be submitted to the government by its deadline of 28 November.

One unitary council

Oxfordshire County Council is backing the idea of having one unitary authority. It estimates the initial set up costs will be £21.9m and the change would generate savings of more than £63m a year.

Two unitary councils

Five councils have backed plans for two unitary councils across Oxfordshire and West Berkshire. There would be one authority to the north - the Oxfordshire and Shires council - covering Cherwell, Oxford City and West Oxfordshire. The second authority would be further south - called the Ridgeway Council - and cover South Oxfordshire, Vale of White Horse and West Berkshire. The transition cost is estimated at £30.4m, with savings anticipated to reach £59.8m a year.

Three unitary councils

A proposal for three unitary councils is being put forward by Oxford City Council. It would include a Greater Oxford Council, which would extend the city's boundaries out into the green belt (and would take in Sandford). Similar to the two unitary option, it would also include a northern Oxfordshire council covering the rest of Cherwell and West Oxfordshire. Plus there would be a southern Ridgeway Council including West Berkshire. The transition cost is estimated at £36.2m, and it is anticipated savings would reach £48.5m annually after five years of operation.

What happens next?

Once the three proposals are submitted, the government says a consultation could be launched in early 2026. That is likely to last until the local elections in May 2026. Government ministers will then decide, subject to parliamentary approval, if any of the proposal will be implemented, with or without modification. It says it will take into account representations and consultation responses - with a final decision announced before summer 2026. That would allow for elections to the new unitary authority, or authorities, in May 2027.

The new structure would then "go live" in April 2028.

1. Public participation: to receive questions from members of the public relating to items on the agenda, in accordance with the Council's code of conduct and standing orders

- a. *Replacement of WW1 100 year anniversary tree:* Parish Council agreed to replace the tree and source a tree guard.
- b. *Photographic competition:* Request from VHC for £250 towards prizes. VHC will ask entries for permission to use photographs on Parish Council website. Parish Council agreed to fund the prizes.
- c. *Parishioner question about 20mph zones.* There are ongoing safety concerns with the speed of the large lorries entering the Laing O'Rourke site. The Parish Council will ask for more visible 20mph signage, including road painting and replacement of the sign at the Grenoble Road. The Parish Council will also ask OCC about the possibility of road narrowing (priority in/out) to slow down traffic. There is a 30 painted on the dual carriageway end of the Henley Road which needs updating. There is a current request with LOR to fund speed Indicator devices for the parish. Parishioner noted that in Cornwall there are SIDs that record the car registration and are very effective. The Parish Council will investigate the funding currently available through Thames Valley Police for road safety measures.

2. Minutes: Approved and signed the August minutes

3. Clerk's report notes as follows:

- a. The Parish Council advised that unless vehicles are parked illegally there is nothing they can do
- b. The Parish Council will investigate responsibilities and ownership of the waterways in the parish
- c. Parish Councillors to review recent report of a blocked right of way, and a report of a missing kissing gate
- d. Issues with parking outside the Catherine Wheel pub reported. The Parish Council will ask for guidance from Road Traffic officers and Highways team. Noted that the parking bays have faded paint lines.
- e. The recent cleaning works carried out by District Council workers only reached halfway down Church Road (on the recreation ground side). Several residents reported issues with drains. The Parish Council will request the District Council return and complete gully/drain clearance works throughout the parish.
- f. Parish Councillors will inspect salt bins in the parish and inform the Clerk if more salt needs to be ordered for this winter.
- g. The Parish Council are obtaining quotes for replacement bollards along the roadside edge of the Wharf, and to move the gate to the tarmac area (with a 'do not obstruct' sign to be added to the gate). The Parish Council will ask OCC if the bollards can be moved closer to the road's edge to prevent vehicles parking on the grass.
- h. The Parish Council will install 'no bicycles' signs at each end of the path that goes through the Community Orchard due to recent reports of damage to the path surface.
- i. The Parish Council will investigate the legal status of the strip of ground by Broadhurst Gardens and OPT ground. Is there a covenant, wayleave or similar across this land? There is currently a 'no dogs' sign at the playground end, which will be reviewed once the designation of the land is confirmed.
- j. The hedge at the property on Henley Road severely affects the use of the pavement and no response to PC communications. The Parish Council to ask the District Council for assistance.

4. Parish Matters

- a. Parish Council to ask contractors to crown lift tree at the end of Yeftly Drive
- b. Parish Council to ask for a quote for Brick Kiln Lane verge to be included in regular cutting schedule, and all the areas of grass up to the end of Henley Road. Parish Council to ask OCC which authority is responsible for the verges up to the Science Park roundabout.

- c. Parish Council noted Wharf grass was still not cut, but the gate has now been shut due to unauthorised camping. Brambles are coming back round the edge..
- d. Parish Council agreed that all areas of grass need cutting before the end of August including the wildflower designated areas.
- e. Parish Council noted the footpath adoption at the A4074, and asked about the railings in place at the end of Heyford Hill Lane, Parish Clerk to ask whether there is scope to move them.

5. Community Orchard

f. The Parish Council will send the apple press invoice to the College for reimbursement. Parish Clerk to check how much balance is left in College funds for the Community Orchard. Councillors discussed the purchase of an electric trimmer and battery.

We heard that South Oxfordshire District Council has been asked to withdraw its Local Plan and that a legal challenge is underway. Cost-of-Living Grants are open until 6th November.

At county level, councillors are seeking reassurance on emergency plans linked to the reservoir, and the Oxford Cowley Line upgrade has been approved, including two new stations and regular services to London.

Around the Village

Highways have cleaned Church Road and will clear the drain soon. The council is also waiting to hear back about a possible community noticeboard at Park Homes.

- A meeting is planned with the Catherine Wheel landlord to discuss parking.
